



Court staff and bailiffs' training in European civil and criminal law

A modern and practical approach to judicial training for court staff and bailiffs in Europe





About the project



Under the Justice Programme 2021-2027, ERA is implementing a new training project for court staff and bailiffs in partnership with the European Judicial Training Network (EJTN), the Belgian Judicial Training Institute (IGO-IFJ), the Bulgarian National Institute of Justice (NIJ), the Romanian National School of Clerks (NSC) and with the support of 13 national judicial training institutions and the European Union of Judicial Officers (UEHJ).

Recent studies and reports show that court staff and bailiffs receive insufficient training in EU law. Building on the knowledge and experience gained from the implementation of previous court staff training projects, and following the recommendations made in the recent "Study on the training needs of court staff on EU law in the EU", ERA and the project consortium will tackle the deficiencies of court staff and bailiffs' training by adopting a modern and practical approach to EU judicial training and by developing coherent and innovative training packages for future use.

Objectives

- To train ca. 500 court staff and 50 bailiffs by organising 21 interactive and practical legal training activities on EU civil and criminal law matters
- To provide up-to-date standardised training packages to set up interactive seminars for court staff and bailiffs
- To provide advanced training on selected EU instruments in civil and criminal matters, tailormade to their everyday tasks
- To offer stand-alone e-tools for legal English in civil and criminal law matters
- To improve the necessary basic language skills in terms of legal terminology in English amongst court staff and bailiffs to facilitate cross-border communication and cooperation
- To make use of the network of court staff training providers established by EJTN and provide a platform for exchange of best practices, information and knowledge in a practice-oriented way

Methodology

The project will deal with EU civil and criminal law matters relevant for the judicial work of court staff and bailiffs as well as digitalisation. To better accommodate the various training needs of the target groups, reflecting different levels of prior knowledge and experience in applying EU instruments, the legal seminars will be offered at both basic and advanced level. Some activities will offer legal English language training parallel to legal training thus enhancing the linguistic skills of court staff and bailiffs in legal areas with added practical value. To make the activities more accessible and inclusive, they will be offered in various formats (face-to-face, hybrid, online).

Thus, this project will cover the following instruments:

EU civil law

- Brussels Ia Regulation
- European Enforcement Order
- European Payment Order
- European Small Claims Procedure
- Service of documents
- Taking of evidence

EU criminal law

- European Arrest Warrant
- European Investigation Order
- Directives for pre-trial detention, custodial sentences, supervision of probation measures and alternative sanctions Freezing, seizure and confiscation

The training materials for the provision of legal training will mainly consist of case studies covering the abovementioned EU instruments, including the case scenario, suggested solution as well as the necessary background materials and methodological advice for their implementation.

For the provision of language training, two manuals with language exercises will be developed by linguistic expert. The exercises will focus on developing four skills: reading, writing, speaking and listening.

Participation conditions

Registration

Participation is on selection and free of charge. The number of places available is limited. Interested court staff may register via their respective national training institutions. Interested bailiffs may register via UEHJ.

Participants should have a working knowledge of English.

Travel & Accommodation

Participants will receive a fixed contribution towards their travel and accommodation expenses and are asked to book their own travel and accommodation. The condition for payment of this contribution is to sign all attendance sheets at the event.

No supporting documents are needed. The amount of the contribution will be determined by the EU unit cost calculation guidelines, which are based on the distance from the participant's place of work to the seminar location and will not take account of the participant's actual travel and accommodation costs.

Successful applicants will be sent the relevant claim form and information on how to obtain payment of the contribution to their expenses. Please note that no payment is possible if the registered participant cancels their participation for any reason.
